- To ensure stability for members and fulfil a key principle of providing value for money, we will actively engage with you as we determine how CICM will operate, including future fees, exams and membership categories.

We're ready for independence

2025 marks the 15th anniversary of FICM. In that time, we have grown the intensive care workforce, pioneered the definitive reference source for our specialty in GPICS, embedded frameworks to support professional development across our diverse membership and driven Fellowship of the Faculty of Intensive Care Medicine (FFICM) examinations.


We've appreciated the support of our eight parent colleges – and especially that of our host and lead parent the Royal College of Anaesthetists (RCoA) which has backed our case to become independent.

Forming the College of Intensive Care Medicine (CICM) will reflect the identity of intensive care medicine as a distinct and growing specialty. We are following the same journey as other faculties who similarly outgrew their parent colleges, with recent examples including both the RCoA and the Royal College of Emergency Medicine.

Our values show how we operate in the world and respect each other.


As we progress with the establishment of the new College, it will be important to engage our members in identifying these values.



Where are we now?


FICM is a faculty of 8 parent colleges:

Governance structure



The RCoA Board of Trustees:

- Responsibility for ensuring RCoA and its Faculties are run in accordance with charity law
- Responsibility for approving FICM member fees and governance
- Does not include any members of the FICM Board to directly represent the specialty's views

The FICM Board and Committees:

- Represent ICM as part of the RCoA and with wider partners, with the FICM Dean a voting member of the RCoA Council and Finance & Resources Board and the RCP Council
- Lead the specialty of intensive care medicine through its Committees, Groups and by hosting the Critical Care Leadership Forum (CCLF)

Where are we headed?

A home for the specialty that thrives as a diverse, inclusive, and reflective community that will improve career paths as well as national visibility, with collaborations tailored to ICM needs.


Our own governance structure to manage the College and the specialty, that builds on the strengths and achievements of FICM.

The CICM Board of Trustees:

- Responsibility for ensuring **the College** is run in accordance with charity law
- Responsibility for approving CICM member fees and governance
- Includes CICM members and lay Trustees to provide expertise and oversight

The CICM Council:

- Responsibility for leading the specialty of ICM including its standards and strategy, curriculum and future exams
- Responsibility for managing the relationship with RCoA Council and wider partners, representing the diversity of CICM members
